

Practical insight



When I started managing projects in 2021, there wasn't a day I hadn't done my very best. Working long hours when necessary, doing the unpleasant part of the job with precision, always catching opportunities to implement actions, and delivering results. In time, I gained the respect of my team.

Reaching the point where I had a holistic view of every project I managed wasn't easy. And in such a

process, I eventually made some bad decisions, which were part of developing myself at the job. One key asset at the beginning of a career in project management is the ability to ask questions. To accomplish that, you must first understand that the people in your team are specialists in what they do. They possess a deep understanding of the processes they are responsible for. You, as a project manager, must have proximity to each member of the team, knowing them well and earning their trust and respect. Asking questions about their jobs is then important to understand everything related to the projects you manage, every operation, every technology used, and every process to implemented.

Theoretical perspective

The ability to ask the right question is often cited as a critical leadership skill. According to The Art of Asking Questions by Marilee Adams, Ph.D., inquiry-based leadership helps create a culture of curiosity and continuous improvement. It's a tool to uncover insights and foster collaboration. The best project managers are those who aren't afraid to ask questions, even if it reveals their own uncertainties. This transparency can help to build trust within the team and promote a learning environment.

Consider the case of the Boeing 787 Dreamliner project. In its early stages, the project faced significant delays and cost overruns, partly due to communication breakdowns within the team. Managers were reluctant to ask hard questions, which allowed small issues to escalate into larger problems. When a new project manager took over, their first step was to gather the team and ask fundamental questions about processes, challenges, and goals. This open dialogue uncovered root causes of delays and allowed for corrective actions, leading to the successful completion of the project.



Practical insight

I can't stress this enough, taking notes is one key asset on your journey as a project manager. You will deal with a mountain of information, sometimes it will be extremely difficult to keep under control. Therefore, taking notes, as well as being methodical, will help you to keep things under management, giving you space to think and act on it.

Theoretical Perspective

Methodical organization is essential in project management. According to the PMBOK® Guide (Project Management Body of Knowledge), one of the critical knowledge areas is project integration management, which includes keeping track of all project components, ensuring that they work together efficiently. Taking notes, creating process roadmaps, and maintaining thorough documentation are practical ways to achieve this integration.



In the case of the construction of the Burj Khalifa, the tallest building in the world, methodical organization project involved coordinating key. The was thousands of workers, suppliers, and engineers from all over the globe. The project manager used a detailed project plan, with every task and milestone meticulously documented. This methodical approach ensured that even as challenges arose, there was a clear reference point to adjust timelines and resource allocations, leading to the successful completion of the tower.
